The withdrawal of Wholesale Line Rental (WLR) products and the transition to IP Voice services

Public Switched Telephone Network (PSTN) closure and what it means

We're modernising the way we deliver telephone services to the UK. The PSTN is ageing and will reach the end of its life in December 2025. New digital technologies are taking its place, which means over 16 million lines and channels will need to move to alternative products before the network is switched off.

Moving to new technologies will open the door to exciting opportunities to develop more reliable and future proof products and services for decades to comes.

Why are Wholesale Line Rental products being withdrawn?

The PSTN currently supports wholesale products like WLR3 analogue, ISDN 2, ISDN 30, LLU SMPF, SLU SMPF, Narrowband Line Share and Classic products.

These products, collectively referred to as WLR products in the industry consultation, deliver analogue voice and broadband communications for home and businesses. When the PSTN closes, these products will no longer be available.

How will we do this?

We're working with the industry to build a CP inventory of line connections to determine the impact on end customers and we've started discussions with industry regarding trialling the WLR withdrawal process.



Goodbye old telephone network, hello new opportunities!

We're working with Ofcom, Communications Providers (CPs), the OTA2 (Office of the Telecommunications Adjudicator), the NICC (Network Interoperability Consultative Committee) and trade bodies to make sure things go as smoothly as possible.



As we upgrade we'll pay particular attention to lines that:

- underpin Critical National Infrastructure
- keep the vulnerable connected
- and support special services like alarms and monitoring devices

^{*}PSTN (Public switched telephone network) is the familiar landline telephone system which allows for analogue voice and broadband communications for home and businesses.

^{**}ISDN (integrated services digital network) is newer arrival that allows the digital transmissions of voice, video and other services simultaneous, and is typically used for business connections.
